

THE APOSTLE JAMES

Brother of our Lord (October 23)

oly Apostle James, the Brother of God (Adelphotheos) was the son of Righteous Joseph the Betrothed of the Most Holy Theotokos (December 26). From his early years James was a Nazarene, a man especially dedicated to God. The Nazarenes vowed to preserve their virginity, to abstain from wine, to refrain from eating meat, and not to cut their hair. The vow of the Nazarenes symbolized a life of holiness and purity, commanded formerly by the Lord for all Israel. When the Savior began to teach the nation about the Kingdom of God, St James believed in Christ and became

His apostle. He was chosen as the first Bishop of Jerusalem.

St James presided over the Council of Jerusalem and his word was decisive (Acts 15). In his thirty years as bishop, St James converted many of the Jews to Christianity. Annoyed by this, the Pharisees and the Scribes plotted together to kill St James. They led the saint up on the pinnacle of the Jerusalem Temple and asked what he thought of Jesus. The holy Apostle began to bear witness that Christ is the Messiah, which was not the response the Pharisees were expecting. Greatly angered, the Jewish teachers threw him off the roof. The saint did not die immediately, but gathering his final strength, he prayed to the Lord for his enemies while they were stoning him. St James' martyrdom occurred about 63 A.D.

The holy Apostle James composed a Divine Liturgy, which formed the basis of the Liturgies of Sts Basil the Great and John Chrysostom. The Church has preserved an Epistle of St James, one of the books of the New Testament.

In 1853, Patriarch Hierotheus of Alexandria sent to Moscow a portion of the relics of St James. The Church distinguishes between the holy Apostle James the Brother of God, and St James the son of Zebedee (April 30) and St James the son of Alphaeus (October 9).

Spiritual Healing

THE GOSPEL LESSON THIS WEEK iS St. Luke's account of the healing of the Gerasene Demoniac (Luke 8:26-39). (A demoniac is a person believed to be possessed by a demon.) We heard St. Matthew's account (Matthew 8:28-9:1) earlier in the year. The most obvious difference between the two accounts is that Matthew tells of two demoniacs, but Luke only one. St. John Chrysostom speaks to this discrepancy by offering the opinion that St. Luke did not say that there was just one. Rather, he thinks that Luke was singling out the fiercest one for his narrative.

Leaving aside this difference, I think that the additional details that both Luke and Mark provide in their respective renderings give us some powerful insights into the demoniac's healing, as well as our own spiritual struggle. St. Matthew oftentimes gives us a "bare bones" account of the stories he's relating. When we read all four of the Gospels we are able to gain valuable details and insights that provide a more complete picture.

Here is a brief recounting of the story. Jesus and his disciples land on the opposite side of the Sea of Galilee in the country of the Gerasenes. There they encounter a demoniac who pleads with Jesus not to torment him (them) before the time. Jesus grants the demons' request to enter a nearby herd of swine, which the demons then lead to immediate destruction. The resident Gerasenes were terrified by the Lord's action and asked him and his disciples to leave, which they did.

I would like to focus on two aspects of this story that St. Luke, as well as St. Mark, bring to our attention. The first is the "name" of the demon, and the second is what Jesus asks the man to do after he has been healed.



When the Lord encountered the demoniac on the shore, naked and dwelling in tombs, he immediately commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man (v. 29). The man (that is, the demons) pleads with Jesus not to cast them into the abyss. Then Jesus asks, "What is your name?" (v. 30) The man replies, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. (v. 30)

Let's pause here and reflect on the word "legion." A Roman legion consisted of 3-6,000 soldiers. While we might consider that the demons were using the term metaphorically, this still means that "many demons had entered" the man. Think about the torture and torment that this man was suffering. We know from the Gospel accounts that even when guarded and kept shackled with chains, the demons would give him the strength to break the bonds and then drive him into the wild. St. Mark tells us that he howled and cut himself with stones. (v. 5:5)

Was it the demons who were driving him to self-destruction, or was it his true self trying to be free from the tor-

ment? It would be hard for us to even imagine what this man was suffering. Perhaps we can gain some sort of insight when we're told that even the swine threw themselves over a cliff and into the sea in order to be free from the demons.

Now, to the second point, what the Lord asks of this man. After being healed the man "begged" Jesus to allow him to join his company. Jesus tells him to go back home, saying, "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." (v 39) St. Mark records Jesus as saying, "Go home to your friends, and tell them ... what mercy God has shown you." (v. 5:19)

The man's healing was not complete. Surely he was embarrassed knowing all of the terrible things he had done. He did not want to face the people who knew him when he was sick. At the same time, the Gerasenes were either frightened by or unwilling to accept the healing. They saw what the demons had done to the man and the effect they had even on the swine. To accept the man's healing would compel them to believe in the power of God's Grace. After He had healed the man, they wanted, even needed. Jesus to leave as well. It would seem that both the man and the townspeople need time for more healing — a spiritual healing.

We often ask for God's help, but we should know that His help comes "at a price." God, in the person of Jesus, does indeed meet us on our own level, where we are at, but we will not be left unaffected. God's love for us requires a response. The encounter with God will ask us to have the faith and courage to change and grow.
