

THE KINGDOM OF GOD IS WITHIN YOU

N THIS SUNDAY, FOLLOWING THE FEAST OF THEOPHANY, we read how our Lord began his earthly ministry (Matthew 4:12-17). Immediately after his Baptism in the Jordan River by John, Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness for forty days and nights, and there He was tempted by the devil (Matthew 4:1-11). He did not begin to preach immediately, but, like the prophets before him, he withdrew to the desert to fast and pray. St. John Chrysostom adds that the Lord wanted to give us an example: after our own baptism we should expect to be tempted and put to the test, and that private prayer in solitude, along with fasting, were critical to the spiritual life.

Even after his trial in the desert, Jesus does not begin his ministry. He will not begin preaching while John is still active. John's prophetic ministry was intended to prepare the way for people to be receptive to Jesus' call, but while he was still preaching and baptizing, most people thought that John was the Messiah. John had a great following, including a number of disciples that gathered around him. Chrysostom says that the Lord was careful, in this way, not to divide and confuse the people. He waited for John to complete his ministry before beginning his.

So, only when the Lord hears that John has been arrested and imprisoned does He begin his ministry. St. Matthew says, that "when Jesus heard that John had been arrested ... he left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea" (v. 12-13). To emphasize the importance of this move, St. Matthew then quotes the Prophet Isaiah (9:1-2) who says, that "the people [of Galilee] who sat in darkness have seen a great light." Then Matthew tells us that Jesus begins his ministry by proclaiming: "Repent,



for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (v. 17).

The move from Nazareth to Capernaum was significant in a number of ways. Practically speaking, Nazareth was a small village and Capernaum was one of a number of busy and prosperous small cities on the western shore of the Sea of Galilee. If he wanted to reach a large and diverse population with his message, Capernaum was the logical place to go. There is another reason as well, a spiritual reason alluded to by St. Matthew when he quotes Isaiah. The original territory of the Tribes of Zebulun and Naphtali was the first to be separated from ancient Israel. Therefore, the first part of Israel that had experience the destructive wrath of God now should be the first to hear the good news of salvation.

Jesus' message is a little softer than John's. John was the "voice crying in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight" (Matthew 3:3). The Lord takes up the central theme of

John's preaching: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 3:1, 4:17), but His call for repentance is surrounded by the warmth of His love and the comfort of God's forgiveness.

The phrase "kingdom of heaven" is easy to misunderstand, especially in the English translation. We normally translate the Greek word "βασιλεια" (vasilia) as "kingdom." However, a much more accurate translation would be "reign," as in the reign of a ruler. "Kingdom" gives the sense of a territory or a nation. "Reign" evokes the sense of the way in which a ruler rules. When Jesus speaks of the Reign of God or the Reign of Heaven, he's not talking about a place, but rather a way of understanding how God should become the ruler of our hearts. "Once Jesus was asked ... when the kingdom of God was coming, and he answered, 'The kingdom of God is not coming with things that can be observed; nor will they say, 'Look, here it is!' or 'There it is!' For, in fact, the kingdom of God is within you." (Luke 10-21)

Perform this small exercise. Go back and read again the passage from St. Luke quoted above. Only, this time substitute the word "reign" everywhere you read "kingdom." Can you see how it changes your perspective on where to look for the "kingdom" of God? God reigns from the inside, not the outside. He knows that only only way to change how we act toward one another is to change who rules our hearts.

"BURN THE MORTGAGE" CAMPAIGN ENTERS FINAL STAGE



Nearly two years ago, the parish undertook an initiative to pay off the principal amount due under the church's mortgage in order to finish this first phase of our building project. Presently, the principal balance due on the mortgage is \$523,000. As a result of our campaign, we've received 19 pledges totaling \$117,250.

By God's Grace, we have wonderful announcement to make. Thanks to the faithfulness and generosity of Vasil (Billy) and Elva Gartsu, founding members of our parish, St. Nicholas has received a bequest in the amount of \$300,000 to be applied against the principal debt of our mortgage. We are humbled and overwhelmed by their exstewardship ample of faithfulness. Vasil and Elva were humble and hardworking people. Throughout their lives they were faithful stewards of their time, talent and treasure to the church. When Elva married Billy she was

not Orthodox. In fact, when they were married the entire service was conducted in Romanian and Elva didn't understand a word. It was only when Fr. Nicholas was appointed priest at St. Nicholas, and the services were celebrated in English, that she began attending Liturgy regularly, pulling Billy along with her. It was then that Elva expressed her desire to embrace the Orthodox faith. Together, they became stalwarts of the Parish.

Vasil fell asleep in the Lord over a decade ago. Elva continued her devotion to the Lord and her dedication to the Parish. Remembering the original Church on Hammond Street in Worcester, she expressed her constant desire to see a new Church on our current site in Shrewsbury. While she didn't see the new Church itself, she certainly saw the new structures and design. As she declined in health, her constant wish was that whatever resources she had should be devoted

to seeing the completion of the new St. Nicholas. Both her and Vasil's faith are a great blessing for our St. Nicholas community.

Where are we now? How do we get to where we need to be? As a result of the pledges previously made and this generous and profound gift, ONLY \$106,000 remain to be paid on the principal in order to finish paying off this current debt! Given where we began only a few years ago, our St. Nicholas Parish has a property valued at \$1.9 million dollars. Yet, we still have the Church building to build.

OUR CHALLENGE RIGHT NOW is to finish the work and receive pledges that would pay off the full debt by Palm Sunday 2016. Of course the dollar total is important, but equally as important is that we have every member of our parish contribute towards this goal, at whatever level is within their means.

During the season of Epiphany Fr. Nick visits each of our homes to bless them and ask for God's blessing on our families in the coming year. We also ask this year that each one of us consider the importance of our St. Nicholas community in our lives. Reflect on the example of faith and love that Vasil and Elva Gartsu have shown. We all need to participate in the paying off of our church mortgage to the Glory of God and to securing the future of His Church for generations to come.
